Reduce, Reuse, Recycle...

Mention these words to most people and they only think about recycling bottles and cans. But conservation is more than just getting money for your CRV. The Costa Mesa Sanitary District (CMSD) has put together this Green Living Guide to help you make responsible choices in the disposal of your waste products.



In addition to taking advantage of the local programs listed in the Guide, the CMSD reminds you to:

- Use reusable bags *whenever* you shop, not just at the grocery store, to reduce the amount of plastic shopping bags;
- Purchase materials in bulk whenever possible to reduce packaging;
- Donate usable items to local residents or charities (see page 11) instead of throwing them away;
- Keep materials out of the streets. The storm drain system is for rain water only. Any trash and other pollutants in the street flow with the water directly to the Pacific Ocean.

Door-To-Door HHW Collection Program for Immobile Residents

CMSD sponsors a **FREE** door-to-door household hazardous waste (HHW) collection program for individuals who may not otherwise have the ability to recycle or dispose of their hazardous materials at permanent HHW facilities. Qualified residents must be 62 years of age or older, or be a certified disabled person.

Large Item Collection Program

CMUSD customers can request convenient curbside collection of large or bulky items at their home. Residents are eligible for three (3) complimentary pick-ups per year. There is a limit of 10 items per call or collections can be combined for a total of 30 items per calendar year.



To schedule, ***please call CR&R Customer Service at (949) 646-4617 Monday thru Friday from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.*** Residents must provide a detailed list of items to be collected. Please note, drivers will not collect any items not specified in advance.

for your weekly trash pick-up, you will need to call your contracted waste hauler (the name and phone number is on the dumpster) to arrange for pick-up of the large item.

However, before you dispose of usable items, consider donating them to local charities (see page 11). You can receive a receipt for tax purposes, assist those less fortunate, and practice “Reuse & Recycle”.

Residents who use dumpsters at their property are not eligible for this program. If you need to dispose of a large item, such as a refrigerator, furniture, etc., and you currently utilize dumpster service

Sewer Lateral Assistance Program

The CMUSD Sewer Lateral Assistance Program (SLAP) is a financial incentive program to encourage residents to maintain their lateral sewer lines. Without regular maintenance, sewer lines can become blocked and cause material to back up into the house and the environment.

In general, the CMUSD’s program will contribute 50% of the resident’s cost up to a maximum of \$1,100 per residential parcel. Costs may include televising the lateral interior, cleaning the pipe, installing a clean out attachment, and reconstruction costs.

The most common cause of damage to their lines are tree roots that enter the pipes. Roots not only block the flow of materials, but as they grow, they open the cracks where they entered and allow soil and other debris to enter and contribute to blockage. Without regular maintenance, the damage can become severe and costly excavation may be necessary.

The program is only for residential property (not for commercial or industrial property). Residents may only apply for participation once every five years. The General Manager has discretion over all decisions.

Recycling Fundraiser

CR&R, one of our local trash haulers, is sponsoring a bottle and can recycling fundraiser to local schools. The program entails CR&R placing a storage container at the school’s site. The school then promotes the program to the community and collects bottles and cans with the CRV label. Once the container is full, CR&R takes it, weighs the contents, and delivers a check to the school for the value. There is no cost to the school.

Christmas Tree Recycling

The Costa Mesa Sanitary District collects Christmas trees for the two weeks following Christmas and recycles them into mulch.

Residents should place their tree on the ground next to their collection containers for pick up with the regular trash. Please remove all tinsel, ornaments, and the stand. All trees taller than 6 feet must be cut in half to be eligible for this special collection.

The mulch is used both locally and in other parts of California and helps nutrients remain in the soil.



Household Hazardous Waste

Because of their potential for danger to humans and the environment, it is very important for residents to remove household hazardous waste (HHW). These items should never be thrown into the trash. Instead they should be taken to one of the listed Orange County HHW Collection Facilities. The HHW program is *free* to Orange County Residents.

Electronic and Universal Waste



The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) no longer allows TVs and computer monitors to end up in landfills because the glass screens have approximately seven pounds of lead embedded in the glass. Lead can contaminate the ground water supply and is dangerous to humans. These two electronic items are now known as E-waste.

Sharps Disposal

A free home generated sharps recycling program is available to residents of the Costa Mesa Sanitary District.

Residents can safely dispose of used sharps at participating pharmacies.



It is no longer necessary to use a designated sharps container. Needles can now be accepted in any type of sealed container such as plastic water bottles, soda bottles, laundry soap, bleach or coffee containers, etc.

These pharmacies are listed on the Map on page 6, which shows each pharmacy location.

When transporting HHW to a facility, be aware that:

- A maximum of 15 gallons or 125 pounds may be transported per vehicle, per trip.
- Containers larger than five gallons will not be accepted.
- Materials should be in original containers (except automobile fluids).
- All containers must have lids, be sturdy, non-leaking, labeled and protected from breakage.



Residential FOG Recycling Program


The Residential Fats, Oils, and Grease (FOG) Recycling Program encourages residents to keep FOG materials out of the sinks and sewer system. These types of materials can solidify and clog sewer pipes which can potentially cause backups and overflows.

CMUSD joined with the Orange Coast College (OCC) Recycling Center to promote recycling FOG. Residents are encouraged to place the material into a plastic container, like a milk jug, and then take the container to the recycling center.

Green Waste Recycling

Green waste is typically plant material, including grass clippings, leaves, and trimmings from your yard. It also includes fruit and vegetable waste from your kitchen. These materials can be transformed into valuable compost, vermicompost, and plant food through the process of backyard composting, vermicomposting, and grasscycling.

Composting is the process of helping nature speed up the decomposition of green waste materials into compost. When used as a soil amendment, compost enriches the soil, increases soil structure, balances pH, and increases water retention.

The basics of composting is placing green waste into an enclosure, and then adding water and turning the material periodically. Nature does the rest.

Vermicomposting, or composting with worms uses red worms to break down kitchen scraps into vermicompost, commonly known as castings or “worm poop”. The castings are a great organic fertilizer that can be used on house plants as well as garden beds.

Typical home vermicomposting involves placing worms in a plastic tub containing a bedding of moist, shredded paper; feeding them kitchen scraps; and waiting for the worms to digest the material and turning it into vermicompost.

Grasscycling is the natural recycling of grass by leaving clippings on the lawn when mowing. Since grass clippings are fine materials that are mostly water, they decompose quickly and release valuable nutrients back into the soil.

ABOUT THE COSTA MESA SANITARY DISTRICT

The Costa Mesa Sanitary District was formed in 1944 under the Sanitary District Act of 1923. The District boundaries encompass all of the City of Costa Mesa, and portions of Newport Beach and unincorporated Orange County. The population is approximately 116,700.

The District is responsible for residential trash collection and transmittal to a recycling facility for recycling and disposal. The District also provides liquid waste collection and transmission to Orange County Sanitation District facilities for treatment and disposal.

The District's method of recycling allows residents to place all their trash in standardized containers without any sorting. The trash is taken to a recycling facility in Stanton where it is mechanically and hand sorted and the recyclables are removed. The District reached 50% diversion prior to the year 2000 and is in full compliance with all State mandates.

The District uses a combination of public and private services. The private services include a trash hauler, a recycler, an attorney, a treasurer and an engineer. The District throughout its history has used the combination of public and private services.

Since Proposition 13, the District no longer sets a tax rate. Solid and liquid waste collection fees are collected on the property tax bill as special assessments.

The CMSD is governed by a five member Board of Directors, each elected to a four year term. District maintenance, operations, and administration is provided by employees and contractors. The CMSD has received several awards, most notably the District of Distinction Accreditation by the Special District Leadership Foundation, one of the most prestigious local government awards in the state of California.
